About the Committee

The IOC has faced instances where national governments played a role in orchestrating doping programs, compromising the principles of fair play and endangering the health of athletes. The notable case of the Russian state-sponsored doping program, leading to the ban of Russian athletes from the Olympics, serves as a crucial backdrop for this conference topic.

The issue of state-sponsored doping reached a critical juncture with the exposure of a widespread and systematic doping program orchestrated by the Russian government. This intricate saga unfolded, leading to a series of investigations, revelations, and ultimately, the ban of Russian athletes from participating in the Olympic Games. The historical context of the Russian state-sponsored doping scandal is crucial for understanding the magnitude of the issue within the realm of international sports.

In 2014, investigative journalists and whistleblowers began to unveil a state-sponsored doping program in Russia, implicating athletes across various sports and the involvement of Russian sports

officials. The World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) played a pivotal role in investigating these allegations, with the establishment of the Independent Commission led by Richard McLaren.

- → Athlete Rights and Responsibilities: Discussions should consider the rights and responsibilities of athletes in the face of state-sponsored doping, emphasising the need to protect clean athletes while holding those who violate regulations accountable.
- → Global Cooperation: Delegates are encouraged to explore the role of global cooperation in addressing state-sponsored doping. This involves examining international collaboration between sports organisations, governments, and anti-doping bodies to establish a united front against doping practices.

Expected Points of Discussion

- 4. Preventing Future State-Sponsored Doping: The conference topic should explore proactive measures to prevent future instances of state-sponsored doping, including enhanced monitoring, intelligence sharing, and diplomatic efforts to deter such practices.

Understanding that the historical context of the Russian state-sponsored doping scandal provides delegates with insight into the challenges faced by the IOC in upholding the principles of fair play, clean competition, and the credibility of the Olympic Movement, we expect delegates to utilise all provided resources to come to the committee fully aware of what issues to avoid in resolution writing and solution making. We want delegates to analyse the mistakes made in the past, and come to committee with well backed solutions on how the IOC can learn from its previous mistakes and prevent such occurrences in the future.

Addressing state-sponsored doping with a special emphasis on the Russian Olympic ban requires a comprehensive and multifaceted approach. Delegates are expected to contribute to a constructive and solution-oriented discussion, exploring ethical considerations, enforcement measures, athlete rights, global cooperation, and strategies for preventing future incidents of state-sponsored doping.
